Remember HOPE embodies these two concepts in its work to support the long-term revitalization of communities impacted by the Triple Disaster of March 11, 2011.

In speaking with people in Tohoku just after 3.11, we came to understand that restoration of community ties, or *kizuna*, was indispensable to true reconstruction and revitalization of the region. In 2012, we began our community rebuilding project. To date, in partnership with local stakeholders, we have built four community facilities in three prefectures of Tohoku – Iwate, Miyagi, and Fukushima – in areas hardest hit by the disasters. And we have worked with residents and volunteers to fill those spaces with laughter and life.


In this fiscal year, we took our initiative to the next level. We were honored to partner with renowned architect Kengo Kuma to design our newest facility in Rikuzentakata City. His design for the Rikuzentakata Amway House uses local materials and traditional construction techniques to create a space rooted in nature and tradition, and manifesting a strong sense of place. We believe our next Amway House, situated at the heart of Rikuzentakata’s new city center, will further the city’s vision for “An Intentionally Inclusive Community” and serve as a source of regional pride.

Our activities are largely funded by some 8,000 regular donors, as well as many other supporters. We are truly and deeply grateful for the consistent, long-term support we have received from so many over the years.

Seven years have passed since the Great East Japan Earthquake. Japan’s national government has devised a plan to build a new Tohoku. Local governments, private enterprises, universities, and NPOs have come together to support local efforts to build self-reliant and sustainable communities. Yet the unmet needs remain enormous.

Our foundation has never felt such a strong sense of mission. We are committed to supporting Tohoku’s continuing rebirth in cooperation with all stakeholders.

Activity Report

This fiscal year, we moved forward with plans for the fifth Amway community house, and continued a wide range of events and activities based in existing Amway Houses. We continued to provide programs catering to the distinct needs of each community, always in cooperation with local stakeholders and with support from various private-sector and NPO/NGO partners. Volunteers devoted a total of 5,245 hours of their time to support our work.

Rikuzentakata Amway House (provisional name) Scheduled for completion in 2019

The Rikuzentakata Amway House will be built in the heart of the new city, adjacent to the Shin-Rikuzentakata bus rapid transit (BRT) station, the city's new gateway for visitors. The design for the new house includes a public meeting hall, childcare facility, café offering employment for persons with disabilities, social welfare counseling center, and tourist information center. Rikuzentakata aims to build a new city that will meet the needs and hopes of residents and visitors alike, and welcome people of all ages, backgrounds, ethnicities, and identities. Our Amway House project promises to establish a new model for public-private partnership in urban development.

Project Report

Constructed from local materials such as *Kesen* cedar wood, the new house will be deeply rooted in the natural environment and traditions of Rikuzentakata. The central open space will provide a beautiful view of the Pacific Ocean and symbolically elicit harmony between land and sea.

At the unveiling of the Rikuzentakata Amway House design in October 2017, architect Kengo Kuma said that he wanted to “build a house that made full use of the techniques of traditional *Kesen* carpenters* and embodied local history and culture.” Mr. Kuma, while overseeing design of the new National Stadium to be used for the 2020 Olympics, has been a strong supporter of Tohoku. He also took charge of the planning for the redesigned Town of Minamisanriku, host to the first Amway House.

* *Kesen* carpenters are artisans from Kesen in Iwate Prefecture, known for their unique techniques passed down over generations, and for their use of locally-sourced natural materials. *Kesen* carpentry is considered one of the four great carpentry schools of Japan.

Minamisanriku Portal Center Amway House

The Minamisanriku Amway House was the first facility built by the Foundation. Since it opened its doors five years ago, it has provided a meeting place for residents who lost their homes and access to public facilities. With the recent opening of the Sanriku Expressway Interchange, the facility has become even more accessible for residents and visitors. The facility hosts the Minamisanriku tourist association and visitor information center, and functions as a community meeting place, a seminar hall, and point of exchange for students on school trips from elsewhere in Japan and overseas. It also boasts a state-of-the-art playground built by volunteers.

Main Activities

Boasting modern, safe equipment and with the ground covered by soft wood chips, it is a safe place where children can enjoy themselves. The new facility's opening event was headlined by Eric Jacobsen, well known for starring in the children's TV program *Eigo de Asobo* ("Let's Play in English").

Amway House Soma Satobatake Hotoku Center

This center was created as a place to come together and rebuild community for both residents who stayed in place and those who lost all and were forced to flee their former homes after 3.11. It offers yoga, ballet and dance lessons, gymnastics facilities, international exchange meetings, film showings and much more, and is regularly used by local residents.

Nodamura Amway House
Nodamura Remember HOPE Village NEMA-RU

Nodamura Amway House, affectionately known in the local dialect as *NEMA-RU*, provides a community meeting hall and spaces for commercial tenants. In March, a new store specializing in home-made accessories opened in the tenant area. The House hosted the *Nodamura Puchi Yoichi* (Nodamura Little Market) for a second year. In addition, citizens regularly used the building's large interior space and covered atrium area for a variety of community gatherings.

Main Activities

For the second year in a row, renowned children's dance instructor Kiyomi Fukusawa organized a hip hop dance school. She led ten dance classes from August to October, culminating in a performance at the Nodamura Cultural Festival. Forty-six local kids partnered with young international champion hip hop dancers to put on a joint performance at the festival. This program provided local children with an opportunity to develop their skills and self-confidence, achieve their goals, and experience a world beyond their previous experience.

Otsuchi Amway House Remember HOPE Namiita Beach Village

The Otsuchi Amway House, located in the Namiita Beach Park area of the Sanriku Reconstruction National Park, features a community hall and three commercial tenants including a surf shop. This multi-use facility both serves as a gathering place and supports the sustainable economic revitalization of a beachfront area that had been a huge tourist draw and commercial engine of the town before 3.11. The House offers a large grassy recreation area, and features trampolines and terrace seating areas that become a community gathering spot during the warmer months. It also plays host to a large fireworks event in August.

Main Activities

The House hosted a “Skateboard Rampage” event in April. In May, the House co-sponsored a Garden Festival, in which participants planted turf and created flower beds around the facility, as part of a variety of efforts to improve the facility and the surrounding environment. Residents and volunteers worked side-by-side and formed close connections. In August, the annual fireworks festival attracted hundreds of people. Other activities

With memories of 3.11 starting to fade, the Foundation endeavored to remind people elsewhere in Japan of the continuing needs in Tohoku. We created novel ways for people to contribute to reconstruction. In addition, in keeping with Remember HOPE's commitment to listen to the voices of local people, we published created a book to allow disaster survivors to share their experience and advice with others in Japan who might face natural disasters in the future.

Support for the Reconstruction of Tohoku The Remember HOPE Gourmet Experience

The Foundation sponsored an original culinary event at the famous Matenrou teppanyaki restaurant at Tokyo Skytree. Fresh ingredients sourced from Minamisanriku – the location of our initial Amway House – were used in abundance to create an array of gourmet dishes. Gourmet TV celebrity Hikomaro-san headlined a media event announcing the initiative, promoting delicious Tohoku produce and seafood, and underscoring the need to remember Tohoku. Ten Stars Dining (the company operating the restaurant), and the Minamisanriku Tourist Association co-sponsored the two-month promotion. A portion of the proceeds was donated to the Foundation.

Publication of the book, “Disaster Preparedness for Families: Learning from the Disaster Zone” (in Japanese)

The Foundation compiled and published a book on disaster preparedness, a topic of tremendous interest among the Japanese citizenry. If the worst were to happen, how should we protect our families and ourselves? The book recounts the experiences and advice of people in communities hosting Amway Houses who lived through the disaster, in their own voices. It also features an interview with husband and wife celebrities Junichi Ishida and Riko Higashio, reflecting on the lessons Japanese nationwide might learn from their fellow citizens in Tohoku. The press conference launching the book generated considerable print and broadcast media coverage, further amplifying the reach and impact of this initiative.
